A Three-Month Survey of the Bible

These are sample passages that show the skeleton of the Bible's key points of history and central concepts.

Read all of the following passages, chapters, or books, and date the reading when you read it. If any reading is too lengthy for a single day, feel free to spread it over two days or more. Conversely, feel free to read a shorter reading in combination with the next one (or two). And, if this list takes six months or a year, so be it! These readings will be great for you, regardless of how long it takes you to read them.
